E Safety

As part of our ongoing commitment to the safety and wellbeing of our pupils, we want to take this opportunity to highlight the importance of online safety – particularly around the use of apps, games, and social media.

While we understand that many children enjoy playing games and engaging online, it’s essential that they are using age-appropriate platforms and that families are aware of the potential risks. With the right guidance and supervision, technology can be a positive and creative outlet. However, without the correct settings and support, children can be exposed to inappropriate content, contact from strangers, and other online dangers.

We encourage all parents and carers to take an active role in understanding the platforms their children are using and to have regular conversations at home about staying safe online.

To support you in this, we have a dedicated **Online Safety** section on our school website, which includes practical advice and guidance on how to keep children safe on specific apps and games. You can access it here:

How to create a great environment for kids to talk

- TALK EARLY AND OFTEN**
 - Talk with children from an early age to make it easier to maintain good communication
 - Have bite-size conversations that are relevant to them
- CHOOSE THE RIGHT TIME**
 - Choose to talk when you are due to spend some time together, like over a meal or during their bedtime routine
 - Bring digital experience into normal, everyday conversations
- OPEN UP AND SHARE TOO**
 - Model the behaviour you want them to show by sharing about your day
 - Be open and encouraging to make them feel supported
- CREATE A SAFE SPACE FOR YOUR CHILD**
 - Ask open-ended questions
 - Ensure that your child feels listened to rather than cornered
 - When they start talking, hold off with questions and really listen
 - Be prepared, calm and patient with them

> Years 7-13 Family Tips

Help Children Post, Comment, and Upload Responsibly



As children and young people start sharing content and engaging with others online, it's important for them to understand the tracks they're leaving behind and what those tracks might reveal. Parents can help guide their children toward creating the kind of footprint they can be proud of.

Check out these 4 tips

- 1 Be a role model.**
Before you post a photo of your child on social media, ask them if it's OK to share. Not only will you give them control over their own digital footprint, you'll be showing them what you expect them to do with others' photos.
- 2 Use privacy settings.**
Sit down with your children to show the privacy settings you use on your apps and devices. Talk about why you keep certain information private or limited to a small group. Ask them what information they feel comfortable sharing and why.
- 3 Look to the stars.**
Scroll through the Twitter or Instagram feed of a famous celebrity, artist or politician. Discuss the image they project based on their posts. Ask your child what kind of image they would like to create – and what kind of things (funny stories, silly memes, heartfelt videos) add or detract from that.
- 4 Search yourself.**
Take turns looking up your name and your child's name on a search engine and a social platform, then discuss the results. Are you both comfortable with what information and images are available to strangers? Is there anyone whom you wouldn't want to see those results?

Things to cover in conversations

- ONLINE REPUTATION**
 - Understanding how online activity creates a 'digital footprint' that lasts forever
 - Being a good digital citizen e.g. treating people like you would face to face
 - Thinking before posting
- CRITICAL THINKING**
 - Making them aware that some people hide behind fake profiles
 - Being critical about what they see online as not everything is true
 - Agreeing digital boundaries to allow them freedom to make informed decisions
- PERSONAL SAFETY**
 - Keeping info private on devices and apps they use through privacy settings
 - What a good social media profile looks like
 - Create strong passwords for every online account
- RESOLVING ONLINE ISSUES**
 - Tools and strategies to deal with issues they may face online such as cyberbullying or seeing inappropriate content
 - Where & how to report an issue – encouraging them to speak to an adult
- BEST OF THE NET**
 - What they enjoy most about their favourite apps or sites
 - The coolest sites and apps among their group of friends
 - Talking about things online you can enjoy together and ways to stay involved in their digital world



A First Look at Ysgol Afon Wen's New Community Facility




Senior staff at Ysgol Afon Wen were recently given a first glimpse of the school's new community facility — an inspiring development that promises to become a place of connection, care, and collaboration.

Although still under construction, the tour revealed a thoughtfully designed space that reflects the school's commitment to *belonging*, a key strand of our School Development Plan. The facility is being built not just for education, but for the wider community — a place where families, professionals, and local services can come together in support of every child's journey.

The plans include a flexible conferencing area, ideal for hosting parental workshops, training sessions, and community events. Dedicated rooms will provide private, welcoming spaces for health visitors, early years clinics, and wellbeing drop-ins — ensuring families can access support without needing to travel far.

Other features include a multi-purpose kitchen and refreshment zone, a sensory or quiet reflection room, and outdoor gathering areas that encourage informal connection. These spaces will enable a wide range of activities: baby and toddler groups, mental health support sessions, job-seeking advice, intergenerational projects, and more — all rooted in the best practice seen in community-focused schools across Wales.



This facility is a physical expression of Ysgol Afon Wen's belief that schools thrive when they are at the heart of their communities. By opening our doors to families and services, we're building a culture of trust, partnership, and shared purpose.

We look forward to welcoming you into the finished space soon — and to seeing how it grows into a vibrant hub where everyone feels they truly belong.

Travel Code

YSGOL AFON WEN TRAVEL CODE

One very important cornerstone of our 'Afon Wen Way' is the way we respect our community. This includes how we arrive to school in the morning and how we leave at the end of the day. We have reminded all members of our community of the need to show respect at all times, including whilst travelling on public / school transport.

All-Wales Travel Behaviour Code

The All-Wales Travel Behaviour Code is a statutory code created by the Welsh Government to promote safe travel for learners aged 5 to 19 and set standards for their behaviour on all forms of transport to and from education settings. It applies to public buses, trains, cars, walking, and cycling and requires learners to behave respectfully and follow safety rules. The All-Wales Travel Behaviour Code can be accessed here:

YAW WAY

Learners

These guidelines have been prepared to ensure that learners are provided with a quality school transport service. To ensure the provision of comfortable, safe and stress free travel, learners must behave in a way that does not endanger themselves, other passengers, drivers, passenger assistants or other road users.

It is the Council's intention to provide a passenger transport service that will seek to carry learners safely, comfortably and without unreasonable levels of stress.

TELL A TEACHER, PARENT OR DRIVER ABOUT ANY PROBLEMS YOU SEE OR BELIEVE YOU SEE

SCHOOL BUS TRAVEL CODE

- When at the bus stop, always wait sensibly off the road.
- Make an agreement with your parents what to do if the bus does not arrive or if you miss it.
- When the bus arrives wait for it to stop. Never push or rush for the door.
- Show your bus pass (if you have been given one) when you get on the bus.
- On a school bus stay in your seat for the whole journey.
- On a public bus find a seat if one is available.
- Never block the aisle with your bag or other belongings.
- Always wear a seatbelt if one is provided.
- You must not distract the driver when he or she is driving.
- Never sit or drink on the bus.
- Never throw anything in or from the bus.
- Never damage or vandalise any part of the bus.
- Never operate the bus doors or exits, except in an emergency.
- Always follow the instructions of the driver or passenger assistant at all times.
- If there is an accident, stay on the bus until you are told to leave. If it is unsafe to stay on the bus then leave via the safest exit.
- Never try and get on or off the bus until it has stopped.
- Always get off the bus sensibly, taking all belongings with you.
- Never cross the road in front of or close behind the bus.

Parents

These guidelines have been prepared to assist parents to ensure the safety of their child and others when using the school transport service.

Parents are asked to:

- Advise the school about any change of address or other circumstances that may affect transport arrangements. The school will then advise the School Transport Team of changes in order to allow the entitlement to free transport to be checked and where appropriate, the necessary arrangements made.
- Provide an emergency contact number so that you can be advised of any changes to the transport arrangements.
- Ensure that your child does not leave home without a valid bus pass. The Council, in conjunction with the comprehensive schools and the operators, provides a NO PASS NO TRAVEL policy. This means that any learner trying to board school transport without a valid pass will be refused transport and will need to make their own way to or from school. No exceptions will be made to this policy. Lost passes can be replaced. There is a charge. The current cost can be found on the Council's website at www.rctcbc.gov.uk/schooltransport. You can also call telephone 01483 420021 or at any of the Council's OneCall centres. If no action is taken to purchase a replacement pass, the entitlement to transport may be withdrawn.
- In the mornings your child should leave home in plenty of time to get to the bus so that there is no need to rush, particularly if there are roads to be crossed.
- Make sure your child is ready to be picked up at home or at the pick-up point ten minutes before the allocated time. Details of the bus stop pick-up times for the mainstream school transport routes can be found at www.rctcbc.gov.uk/schooltransport. For SEN pick-ups, which are usually from the learner's home address, approximate times can be arranged with your driver.
- Ensure that appropriate supervision arrangements are put in place, and particularly for primary school learners, that your child is taken to and collected from the nominated pick-up points by a responsible adult.
- For SEN pick-ups, drivers and passenger assistants are instructed not to wait longer than five minutes after the arranged times. Any delays can have a significant effect on other learners on the same vehicle. For the benefit and well-being of other learners, please ensure that your child is ready to leave at the agreed pick-up time. The passenger assistant will wait with your child from the roadside outside your home to the vehicle.
- Pick-up points are arranged to balance the need to pick-up children as close to their homes as possible and the need to limit the number of pick-up points to a level which results in reasonable journey times.
- If your child misses the vehicle, for whatever reason, it is your responsibility to ensure your child is able to attend school. No additional transport will be provided.
- Where transport is arranged by taxi, or the pick-up is from the learner's home address, please advise the operator as soon as possible if your child is ill or unable to attend school for any reason.
- In the evenings, a child who has to cross the road after getting off the bus should wait until the bus has driven off before attempting to cross so that they can see and be seen by other traffic. If meeting your child, wherever possible, you should wait at the drop off point (wait, and not on the other side of the road). For SEN drop-offs, the passenger assistant will walk with your child to the roadside outside your home.
- For SEN learners, parents or a responsible adult must be at home to receive your child.
- Ensure that your child understands that they should wear a seatbelt (if the vehicle is fitted with seatbelts) whilst travelling on school transport.
- Encourage good behaviour whilst travelling on school transport and support the operators, drivers, passenger assistants, the School Transport Team and the schools in ensuring that your child complies with the Welsh Assembly Government's Travel Behaviour Code www.travelcode.org.
- Ensure that your child is aware of the need for good behaviour whilst travelling on school transport. If they misbehave on the vehicle, it may result in your child being excluded from home to school transport, in accordance with the Travel Behaviour Code. Parents will then be responsible for the full cost of ensuring that their child is able to attend school.
- Advise the School Transport Team of any concerns you have about the transport provided for your child. A "Report It" facility can be found at www.rctcbc.gov.uk/schooltransport.
- For learners with Special Education Needs, please advise the School Transport Team if your child uses any specialist equipment. You will be required to provide this yourself.
- Ensure that medication is clearly labelled, kept securely in the learner's school bag and handed in at school.


